

**GPPi Roundtable Discussion**  
**Mutual Respect, Common Interests? Perspectives on Emerging Donors in Humanitarian Aid**  
**February 25<sup>th</sup>, 2009**

The purpose of the roundtable is to start an exchange between traditional humanitarian actors and emerging donors, looking at the current and future role of the emerging donors in the international humanitarian system. The discussions will build on the transatlantic focus we have established over the last 13 months in the context of the “Raising the bar: Enhancing transatlantic governance of disaster preparedness and relief” project. Although there is an increase in demand for humanitarian aid, the economic recession has resulted in tight budgets for traditional donors limiting the funds available to respond to humanitarian issues abroad. Fortunately, emerging countries in the Middle East, Asia, Africa, Latin American and Eastern Europe have begun providing humanitarian assistance, widening the pool of donors. However, at the moment little is known about *what* these states do in terms of humanitarian aid, *why* they give and *how* their aid is provided. As these emerging donors begin to engage in humanitarian efforts it is important that their approaches are better understood and their voices heard during the current reform process in the humanitarian system.
